

AKE PLACID, N.Y. — Set amid the tall pine and deciduous forest of the Adirondacks, the Lake Placid Lodge is a quiet retreat and place to unplug in any season. Developed in the late 1800s, the original property was destroyed by fire in 2005 and a new lakeside lodge was built by hand in the Arts and Crafts style. Walking into the main lodge feels like stepping back to a simpler, elegant era with handcrafted furniture, massive stone fireplaces, Hudson River School paintings, and a wraparound porch offering views of the lake.

Call it rustic-chic. The 13 rooms and 17 cabins offer log cabin simplicity with Relais & Châteaux creature comforts such as original Adirondack log furniture, featherbeds with luxury linens, soaking tubs, Wi-Fi, and fireplaces stacked with wood. (But no TVs or phones.) Several cabins near the water are dog-friendly.

PLACID NAMES A PLACE AND **ANAURA**

Guests have three dining options for lake-to-farm-to-table menus developed by executive chef Truman Jones, including a private meal in the wine cellar. Lodge services include complimentary mountain bikes, yoga sessions, lawn games, canoes, kayaks, electric boats and, in winter, snowshoes. A tour of Lake Placid aboard the lodge's 35-foot mahogany Hacker-Craft is memorable. Direct flights are available from Boston to Saranac Lake on Cape Air. The lodge is a short drive from the airport — and guests can be picked

MUD SEASON BIKE RACE

THROUGH NORTHERN VERMONT Mud season will roll around before you know it. Sign up now for the popular Rasputitsa ("mud season" in Russian) Spring Classic, a 45-mile unsanctioned bike race (pictured above) that takes riders through some of northern Vermont's most barren terrain. The April 11 event, limited to 500 participants, draws riders of all abilities who come to navigate the mostly gravel course on road, cyclocross, singlespeed, tandem, and mountain bikes. This year's race winds through small communities and rugged landscapes in and around the town of Burke, gaining 1,226 feet of elevation en route and including a singletrack area known as Cyberia. Registration has just opened. Winners receive bragging rights and high-fives, along with trophies and jerseys. Your \$50 registration fee (\$75 after midnight on Jan.

31) gets you snacks at feed zones, wa-

ter bottles along the route, a timing chip, minimal assistance in case of mechanical or other issues, and a meal and live music at the finish-line party. A portion of the registration goes to the Mary E. Wright Halo Foundation, a nonprofit organization that assists local cancer patients. www.bikereg .com/rasputitsa

PICK (UP) YOUR APPLES

AT A DOWNTOWN ORCHARD Calling all Bostonians: If you missed getting out of the city to visit an apple orchard this fall, head to The Ritz-Carlton, Boston Common next weekend to see the hotel's Pop-Up Urban Apple Orchard. On Oct. 25 from noon to 4, you can buy farm-picked apples from the Belkin Family Lookout Farm in South Natick, and enjoy homemade treats such as apple beignets, caramel apples, mini apple pastries, and spiced apple cider. Or take home a festive tin filled with these seasonal delights (\$25-\$40 each). Partial proceeds from

the urban apple orchard will go to The

BRILLIANT TABLET CAN STAND ON ITS OWN

Lenovo's Yoga Tablet 10 has a vibrant, full high-definition screen and frontfacing Dolby speakers that make it a treat to watch movies and videos. The tablet (pictured below), which has a Quadcomm Snapdragon 400 quadcore processor and the latest Android 4.4 (KitKat) operating system, also comes with an unusual design: The battery lies in a cylindrical ergonomic grip at the base of the machine, putting the bulk of the tablet's weight on one end and making it easier to hold. The built-in stand comes in handy when you want to watch a movie (in horizontal "stand" mode) or type an email (using "tilt" mode). One of my favorite features: the optional Smart Side Bar, a small right-hand menu screen with icons of your most recently used applications. The device has a 10.1-inch screen, a quick-charging 9000mAh battery, and 32GB of internal memory with a micro SD slot that supports cards up to 64GB. \$279.99. 855-253-6686, www.lenovo.com
