NATIVE TASTE OF ANDEAN PARADISE

Tucked in a cloud forest at the foot of ancient and mystical Machu Picchu, Inkaterra Machu Picchu Pueblo Hotel is a bit of paradise in the Peruvian Andes. The award-winning, eco-friendly retreat features 35 Peruvianstyled one- and two-story luxurious bungalows, surrounded by acres of native forest and the gushing Urabamba River.

As nice as these rooms are, you'll want to venture out to explore the grounds. Take a guided walk through 12 acres of recently-restored native forest, home to 192 species of birds (18 of them hummingbirds) and tour the resort's orchid garden, with one of the world's largest collections of plants. 

LARGER (AND HIGHER) THAN LIFE

The Tian Tin Buddha, a 98-foot-tall bronze sculpture known as "Big Buddha," sits atop Ngong Ping Plateau, 2,420 feet above sea level, on Lantau Island in Hong Kong (www.plm.org.hk/eng/home ohp). Getting to the island is a memorable experience, especially if you catch the first cable car on Sunday morning (9 a.m.) to avoid the long lines and crowds. The 25-minute ride above the waters of Tung Chung Bay offers stunning views as the towers of Hong Kong recede and Big Buddha appears like an apparition atop the lush mountain landscape. On the island, a short walk through a commercial village leads to the Po Lin Monastery and the statue. It's best to wear comfortable shoes to climb the 260plus stairs to the viewing platform where six larger-than-life-size bronze statues of devas offer flowers, incense, and other gifts to the Buddha.
