

INVISIBLE PROTECTION FOR YOUR DEVICES' SCREENS

Your gadgets can take a beating when you travel. Dynaflo's Liquid-Armor invisible spray coats the screen of your cellphone, tablet, portable game, and laptop, or even a camera lens to create an anti-scratch protective surface that is supposedly twice as strong as traditional peel-and-stick protectors. The liquid screen protector comes in a 3-ounce bottle with two microfiber cloths or in a kit with single-use wipes. Just apply the product, and the device will ready to use in about 10 minutes and fully dry after a day. I tried it on an old iPod Touch: The protective seal held up well, showing no dings or scratches after multiple drops and spills in the hands of a toddler. DREAM STROLLER FOR MOMS AND DADS

The Origami, made by 4moms, is the Lamborghini of strollers, complete with swoopy lines and high-tech features that draw curious glances and double takes. The tricked-out baby stroller has daytime running lights, pathway lights that automatically turn on in low-light situations, and an LCD screen on the handlebars that tells the temperature, your speed, and your trip and lifetime mileage. The stroller opens and closes with the push of a (lockable) button so you can handle setup and breakdown with one hand, and it charges itself while you are walking using generators in its rear wheels. The Origami comes with two cup holders on the handlebars and a storage pouch near the "undercarriage." Mexico full of pacific pleasures

At sea and on land, its hospitality, cuisine, natural beauty still reign

PUERTO VALLARTA, Mexico — In the sleepy seaside village of Quimixto chihuahuas snooze on dirt roads dotted with fallen avocadoes. On the opposite shores of vast Banderas Bay from the cruise-ship port of Puerto Vallarta, Quimixto is best reached by boat, such as the high-speed inflatable speedboat that had my kids shrieking with delight. The ridge of the Sierra Madres became a blur as we cruised atop the Pacific waters and soon were welcomed by pelicans on the docks.

Back on land, we each selected a horse and made our way through a thick forest overgrown with banana plants, guava. and pomegranate trees. After crossing a small bridge, we looked up to see a waterfall plummeting into a natural pool surrounded by wild bougainvillea. We hopped off the horses and went for a dip in the refreshing water, only to be greeted with a plate of hot chips and freshly made guacamole when we dried off.

"Mexico gets a bad reputation in the news," said our guide, Poncho. "Where are all the mean men in big sombreros carrying guns? Instead, you are in paradise."

There is no denying that the surge of drug war-related violence has had an impact on the Mexican Riviera cruise industry. In 2008, the number of cruise passengers leaving from the port of San Diego topped out at 917,000 on some 254 sailings. In 2011, the numbers fell to 307,000 passengers on 104 sailings. Early reports for 2012 show more declines. Port cities such as Mazatlan and Acapulco have been cut from most itineraries because of the violence, leaving only Puerto Vallarta and Cabo San Lucas as major stops.


Holland America Line receives the bulk of the business leaving San Diego. After a relaxing cruise on the Oosterdam with 12 members of my family in February, I'm optimistic that the weeklong jaunt along Mexico's Pacific shoreline will bounce back. Even when walking the crowded Malecon in Puerto Vallarta, we never felt unsafe.

We left San Diego at 5 p.m. on a Saturday and spent the first two days at sea. I quickly found my favorite spot, on the cozy lounge chairs on the 10th floor. High up on the ship, I had an excellent view of the sea and the many dolphins jumping in and out of the water. As we closed in on the bluffs of Cabo San Lucas, we started to spot the numerous whales that call the Mexican Riviera home. Eventually, I got into a rhythm, playing table tennis, Rummikub, and stand-up chess with the kids, retreating to the 10th floor to read and perhaps grab a cup of coffee at the nearby Explorer's Café, then go back to my chair and break out the binoculars.

Our finest meal was dinner at the Pinnacle Grill, where the choice of entrees included a good cut of filet mignon and lobster tail. For dessert, baked Alaska and a rich chocolate cake enticed us. This being a cruise ship, there was never a shortage of food, no matter what the hour. A personal highlight was the chocolate extravaganza, unveiled on three floors late one evening.


We arrived in Puerto Vallarta on the morning of the third day, excited for our shore excursion, Hidden Beaches by Sea and Horseback. Now that Mazatlan is off the cruise itinerary, we would have more than a day and half in the city. After horseback riding, we returned to our high-speed rafts and headed south to the town of Yelapa and the exquisite beach of Pizota. A lunch of carne asada, pollo asado, quesadillas, rice,

down with one of Poncho's strong margaritas. We relaxed in the sand and hammocks and took in the expansive vista of the bay.

That evening, we walked the wide pedestrian-only boardwalk called the Malecon, stopping to see the sand sculptures on the beach and the historic Guadalupe Church that stands tall atop one of the city's main squares. Unlike the high-end stores and restaurants on the Malecon, the narrow cobblestone streets of Old Town have a more authentic Mexican feel, with small shops selling leather goods, tequila, candy, rugs, and jewelry.

On the drive to the Margarita Grill for dinner our taxi driver said that he came to Puerto Vallarta in 1968, when there were 12,000 people in town. Today, the population is over 400,000, with many US expats living in the exclusive hillside community of Conchas Chinas.

Occupying a corner lot in Old Town, Margarita Grill is an al fresco restaurant that serves some of the finest Mexican fare in town. We grabbed a long table and listened to the sounds of Flamenco guitarists. Guacamole is made tableside, and margaritas come oversized. Entrees include pork tacos, fajitas, and the restaurant's specialty, molcajetes, a thick bowl brimming with roasted beef, chorizo sausage, shrimp, chile relleno, sliced cactus, and salsa verde, with a side of warm torti-

Upon arriving at our next port, Cabo San Lucas, we boarded a catamaran and went snorkeling in one of the protected coves. Winds were strong as we headed out into the Sea of Cortez past the sandstone sculptures that line the coastline, including the celebrated

Lover's Arch. Cabo's shores have a much more desolate look than Puerto Vallarta, with an occasional house popping up from the rugged hillside and

sea lions lounging on the rocks. The sea was rough due to strong winds and the water was surprisingly chilly for snorkeling, but I braved the weather and jumped in to view the neon-colored fish. On the boat ride back, we danced to oldschool R&B as the catamaran rocked to the not-so-placid waters. Then, out of nowhere, a pair of whale tails rose above the whitecaps in unison, less than 10 feet from the boat. That one sight was worth the price of admission aboard the Oosterdam and could very well tempt me to make a return trip.
