Handheld tour guide State House to seaside

Explore four centuries of Boston history on the self-guided Norman B. Leventhal Walk to the Sea, and learn more about each of the walk's eight highlights using a new virtual tour. The one-mile walk begins at the Massachusetts State House on Beacon Hill, ends at Long Wharf, and along the way visits such notable stops as the Old State House, Custom House, and Rose Kennedy Greenway. Wheelchair for trekking

Physically challenged travelers can now access Italy's top sites, like the Roman Forum and Pompeii, thanks to a new trekking wheelchair that can handle all types of terrain. The unique chair, provided by Rome and Italy Tourist Services, has a seat, a frame, and one wheel, and two arms in the front and in the back that support the chair when it is stopped and that enable it to be steered by two trained guides. It offers 360-degree maneuverability around obstacles such as stones and holes, and shock absorbers that dampen the ride along the country's ancient streets.
